Regular flooding.

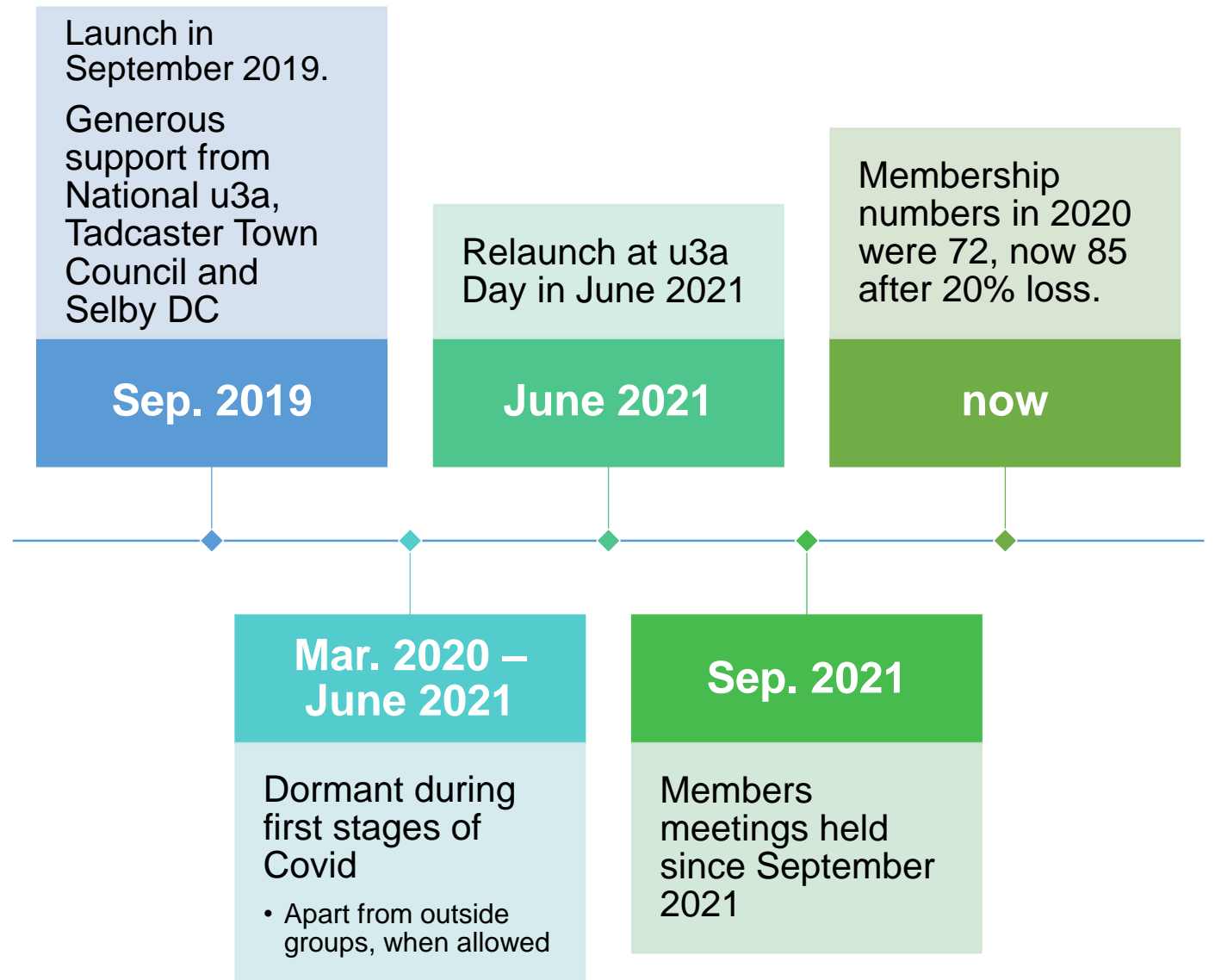

How it started

- Community meeting in Tad offering tables to local groups
- Sue Stokes had a table which got 40 interested signatures
- Steering Committee formed
- It met throughout summer with support from Sue Stokes and Frank Bailey
- Admin and technical issues agreed: level of subs, committee roles, frequency of meetings, basic constitution etc
- Inaugural public meeting in July
- Ready for formal launch in September

20% loss of members during Covid period.

Very slow response to our promotional activity for new members.

Present groups biased to physical activity (eg: walking, dancing, Days Out).

Help/Advice wanted, please

Biggest problem is getting committee members.

Trustees doubling up (I am both Chairman and Treasurer)

Desperate pleas at each members meeting get no response.

When a key person leaves in summer we will be below our quorum

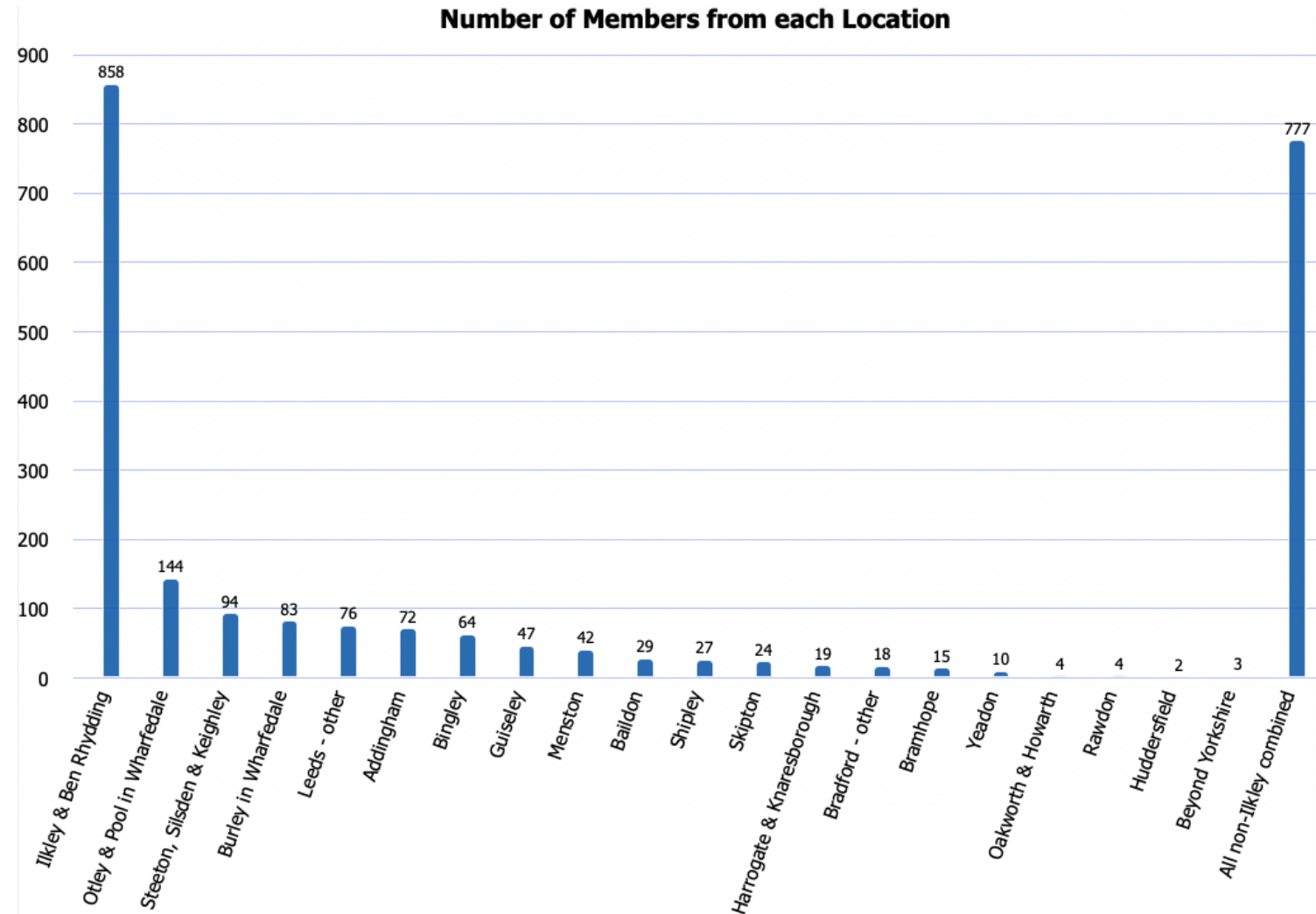

Biosocial holistic approach

Ageing is inevitable but malleable, and the focus should shift from old age, to the **ageing** process, which takes place across the whole lifecourse.

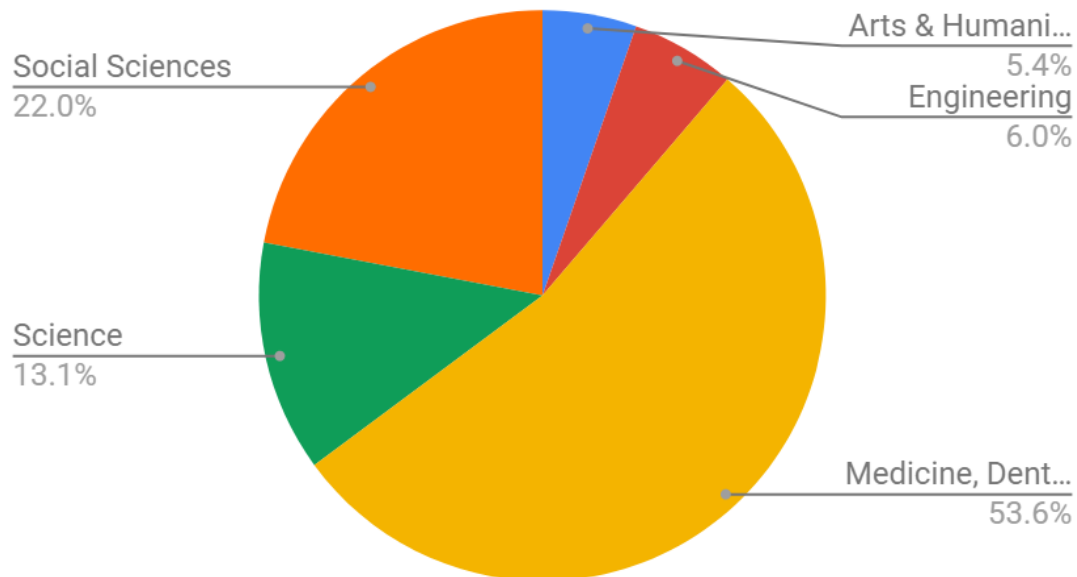

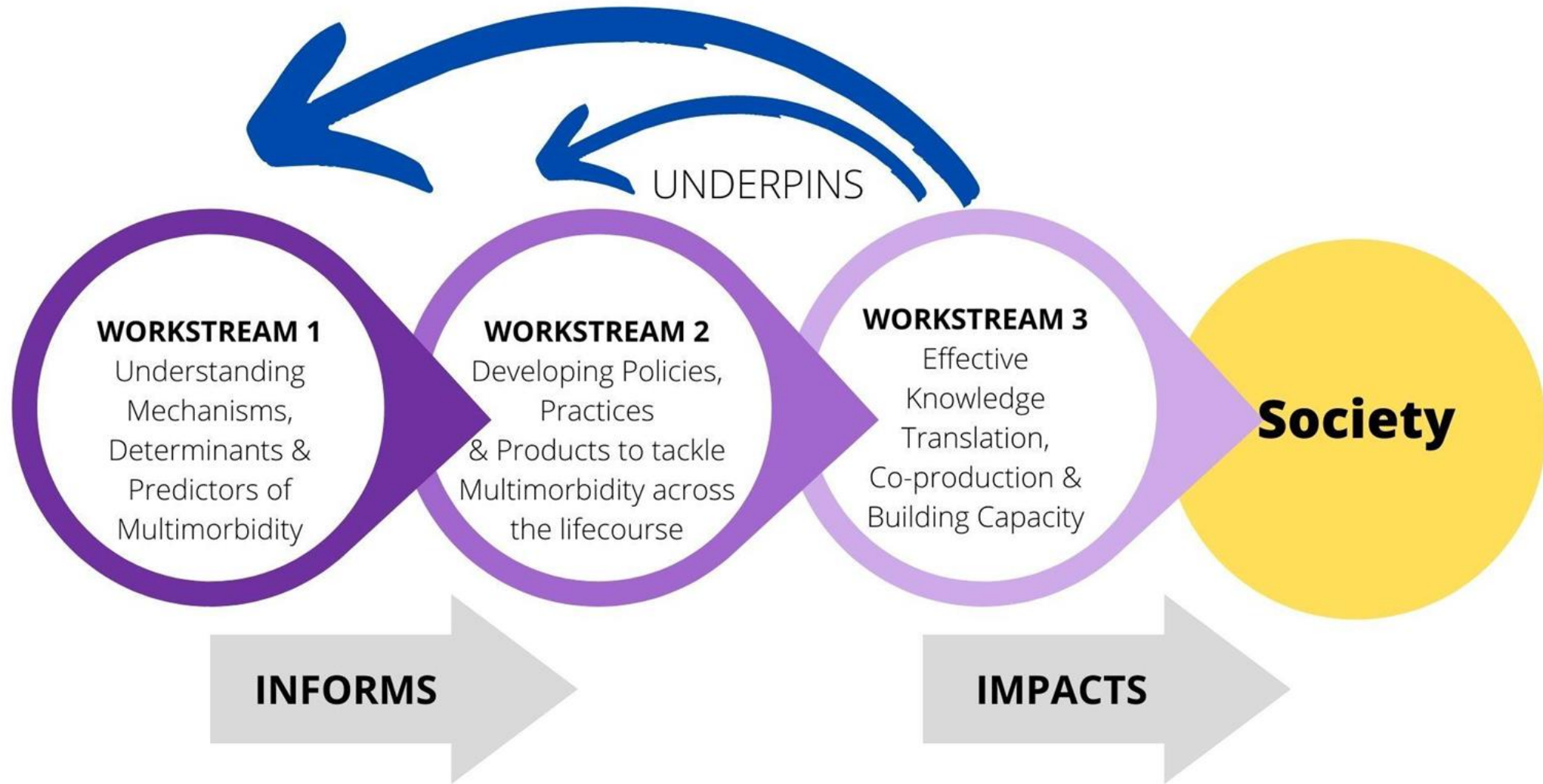

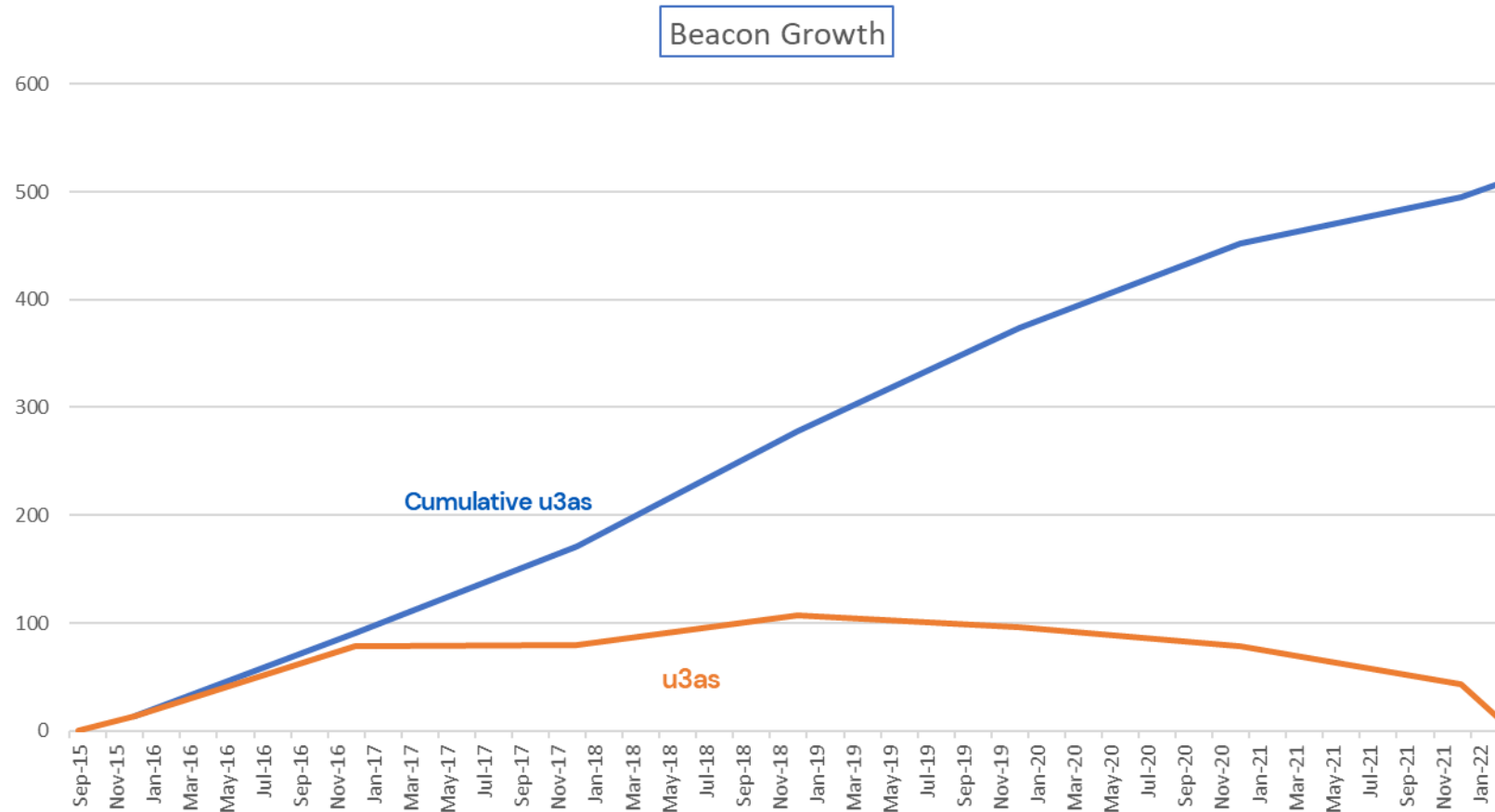
Where are we

- We now have 506 u3as on Beacon
- With over 230,000 members
- We also have four networks using Beacon

- Over the past six months we have upgraded the email system to provide improved delivery reporting.
- We are currently updating the operating system and moving to a new, more flexible service provider.
- We also completed more than thirty updates and enhancements over the past year.
- *Beacon will change the way you work.*

Where are we going

- As Sitebuilder is to change over the next two years, we are looking to introduce an improved integration between Beacon and the web.
- We will be introducing an updated Gift Aid package in the next six months.
- Followed by Finance Package changes.
- *Beacon will change the way you work.*

Beacon can and will

- make your life easier
- allow you to manage your time better
- let you do jobs more quickly and efficiently
- let you keep all your data up to date
- give ready access to your data
- help you to be compliant with GDPR
- and in some ways

Benefits of Beacon

- Always (and only) available to authorised users
- Security for your records
- No duplication of data and additional security
- Simple operation
- Reduced workload for officers
- Continuity when officers change



What do you need?

You will need one person to administer the site.

They will have access to every part of the site

They will manage the individual access and permissions of users in line with committee decisions.

In time they might become the trainer teacher for other users.



Beacon Team support

- Joining Team – general explanation and encouragement showing how Beacon can work for you.
- Supporters – individual support for your u3a.
- Migration Team – help with managing your data into the required format.
- Help Desk – for continuing help after migration.

Beacon for Networks

- Yorkshire and Humber Region are the latest Network to be set up with Beacon.
